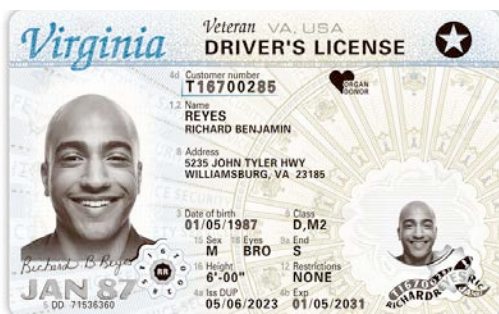
# Happy Hands Zoom Chats

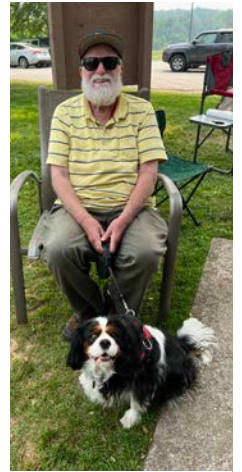

## History of Occoquan

The area that is Occoquan today was long occupied by the Indigenous People, the Doeg Tribe. The word Occoquan is from an Algonquian Doeg word meaning “at the end of the water”. Occoquan River at 24.7 miles in length is a major Virginia tributary of the Potomac. It forms a boundary between Fairfax and Prince William Counties.

FYI: Potomac River is a major river in the Mid-Atlantic region of the United States that flows 383 miles from the Potomac Highlands (Harper’s Ferry) in West Virginia to the Chesapeake Bay (Point Lookout ) in Maryland. The Potomac River meets the Occoquan River 20 miles south of Washington, DC.

What is Occoquan known for? In 1765, Anglo American colonists had established a flourishing industrial settlement at Occoquan with grist mills and tobacco warehouses. Grist mills grind wheats or grains to make flour. Lots of tobacco plants were grown in the area. After tobacco leaves were harvested, the bundles would be hung upside down from the rafters to dry. One of the grist mills at Occoquan was the first in the United States to use an automated system. It continued for 175 years before it was destroyed by fire.

Occoquan Regional Park is a 350 acre park along the tributary for outdoor recreation use in Lorton, VA.

Occoquan Reservoir is 2,100 acres, and a major source of drinking water for both Fairfax and Prince William counties. In 1950 a 30 ft high dam impounded 55 million gallons. As Fairfax County quickly developed in the 1950’s, local officials sought to ensure an adequate water supply. Seven years later in 1957, a 70 ft high dam was built to impound almost 10 billion gallons. This reservoir is an important safe water source for residents of both counties.

Today, visitors enjoy the lovely mix of local shops, restaurants, historic buildings and outdoor parks by the scenic Occoquan River. Several local high schools and colleges use the river for the sport of rowing.

Additional Note: Lois’ daughter Lisa and some of her W.T. Woodson classmates spoke with Fairfax County board members to start a crew club and it was established in 1986. Today, crew practices and competitions continue to use the Occoquan River.

# Chili Casserole

## Ingredients:

- 1 pkg. Fritos Corn Chips
- 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese (mild or sharp, your choice)
- 1 15-oz. can chili (I use Hormel chili with beans. You can use whatever brand or version you prefer.  
You can use leftover homemade chili.)
- 2 10-oz. cans Enchilada Sauce
- 1 8-oz. can tomato sauce
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup sour cream



## Directions:

- Set aside 1 cup chips and ½ cup cheese.
- Combine remaining chips, cheese, chili, sauces, and onion in a microwaveable bowl.
- Cook on high in the microwave for 10-12 minutes.
- Remove from microwave and spread top with sour cream, sprinkle with reserved cheese, and put remaining chips around edge.
- Cook in microwave 2-3 minutes longer to melt cheese.

# Coke Cake

provided by Melanie Williams



## Ingredients:

- 2 cups flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/2 cup buttermilk (Instead of buttermilk, I found that I could use 1/2 cup of regular milk and add 1 tablespoon of lemon juice. Let it sit for about 10 minutes.)
- 1 1/2 cups miniature marshmallows
- 2 sticks margarine (equals 1 cup if you use margarine from a tub)
- 3 tablespoons cocoa
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 cup Coca-cola (or Diet Coke if you prefer)

## Directions:

- Set oven temperature to 350 degrees.
- Combine flour and sugar in bowl.
- Heat cocoa, margarine, and Coke to boiling.
- Pour over flour and sugar and mix well.
- Beat eggs, add buttermilk or milk with lemon juice, baking soda, vanilla extract, and marshmallows.
- Mix well. Add to mixture.
- Batter will be thin with marshmallows floating on top.
- Bake in a long shallow pan. Bake for 30-35 minutes.
- Ice while hot.

## Icing:

- 1 stick margarine (1/2 cup)
- 3 tablespoons cocoa
- 1 cup pecans (I prefer black walnuts)
- 6 tablespoons Coke
- 1 box confectioner's sugar

## Directions:

- Combine margarine, Coke, and cocoa.
- Heat to boiling.
- Pour over confectioner's sugar and mix well.
- Add nuts. Pour over cake.
